# Dear Parents,

We hope that this newsletter finds you all safe and well as we continue to adapt to the ever-changing Government guidelines in staying alert to combat the COVID-19 pandemic. It has been wonderful to have some of our children back in school and we are extremely pleased with how successful the first phase of introducing pupils back to school has been. This has been the result of the collaboration between school staff, parents and children to adhere to new rules within and around school. We would like to commend the children, particularly our younger pupils, who have adapted so well to new routines in school and are trying really hard to stay safe through social distancing and regularly washing their hands. It really has been a pleasure to have them here. We'd like to say a big thank you also to our parents, who are following the new guidelines around school, bringing their children in on time between 8.20 -8.50 am and adhering to the one-way system through the playground before and after school – think of all those extra steps you are getting in! Finally, to our staff, who are always so resilient and flexible, adapting to many changes in the school day and supporting our children and each other in ensuring the phase one return to school has been as safe and smooth as it could be - a huge thanks to you too.

Well done to those children and parents who are continuing to engage with the online learning opportunities provided for you. Your teachers are working hard to ensure they are meeting the needs of the children as best as possible and provide regular feedback, which is very much appreciated.

Following the recent Government announcement this week, schools are not expected to open to all year bands before September. However, we are currently putting plans together to invite more of our children back in to school over the coming weeks. The idea will be that all year bands will be given the opportunity to return to school in some capacity, at some point before the end of term. This will be done over a number of weeks to allow us to phase children back in to school safely. Please see below for more detailed information on the next phases of returning children to school.

Thank you parents and guardians once again for your continued support and co-operation during these challenging times and we hope that you are taking heart, as we are, as some form of normality begins to resume in the coming weeks.

# **School Uniform**

# School Participation in Covid-19 Testing

The Government is calling on schools to participate in a study on the spread of COVID-19. If the school is selected, a nurse will visit each week from 15th June, continuing until the end of the Summer term. The nurse would take nasal swabs from children and provide swabs for school staff to self-test. These would then be analysed and the school and parents would be informed if anyone tested positive for COVID-19. Anyone testing positive would need to follow national guidance and self-isolate for 7 days. Participation in the study is voluntary and parents would need to sign consent forms before their children could take part. The school has been put forward for the study, however as yet, we have not been informed if we have been selected to take part. We will keep you updated as more information comes to light.

# Archbisop IIsley Year 6 Transition

Due to current restrictions Y6 transition will be very different this year. To help ease this transition, Archbishop Ilsley are currently producing a weekly virtual tour of the school to allow the children in Y6 and families to get to know the school a bit better. This is linked to a weekly transition newsletter which is emailed over to parents each week. If you have not received this, it is also tweeted and on the Archbishop Ilsley YouTube page on their website. If your child will be attending Archbishop Ilsley in September, it would certainly be beneficial to watch the tours and read the newsletter which also contain some challenges and activities for them.

# Plans for the Continued Phased return of Children to School

PLEASE READ THE INFORMATION BELOW CAREFULLY.

# **Phase Two**

In **Phase 2** of reopening school, we will be offering the opportunity for the following children to return school on **Monday 22**<sup>nd</sup> **June:** 

- **Siblings** of those children **who are currently in school** in Nursery, Reception, Year 1 or Year 6
- Other children in Nursery, Reception, Year 1 or Year 6
   who have not yet taken up a place will be invited once
   again to return to school on this date. \*Please note that
   we are unable to offer the siblings of these children a
   place as yet. This will be the <u>final opportunity</u> for these
   children to take up a place before the end of term.
- Children in Year 5 will also be given the opportunity to return to school on Monday 22nd June. \*Please note that we are unable to offer the siblings of these children a place as yet.

## PHASE 3

In Phase 3 of children returning to school, we hope to invite children currently in Year 2, Year 3 and Year 4 to return to school as long as we can do this safely. This may be either on a part-time or full-time basis depending on numbers, and will also be a phased return. We are unable to say when this will be at present but more details will follow in the coming weeks, so please read all communications from school carefully and regularly. As we are sure you are aware, in order to bring the children back to school safely, we need to put careful plans and risk assessments in place. Therefore, we must have a clear and definitive idea of the number of children that will be returning to school.

To this end, **all parents** should have received a link via email to complete a questionnaire, asking you whether or not you intend to send your child back to school.

- Please complete the questionnaire by Monday 15th June at the latest. If you do not respond to the questionnaire, we will assume that you will not be sending your child/children back to school at any point before the Summer holidays.
- If you intend to send your child in to school, it must be on a
  permanent basis and attendance is required every day. This
  will allow us to be able to manage staffing numbers and
  ensure we have the capacity to provide a safe environment
  for children and staff.
- Please complete one questionnaire per child and only complete the relevant section for your child. PLEASE DO NOT COMPLETE THE QUESTIONNAIRE IF YOUR CHILD IS CURRENTLY ATTENDING SCHOOL as we are assuming you will take up the offer for siblings to return to school.

# FINAL WEEK OF TERM

Please note that during the last week of term beginning 13th July, **Nursery will be closed and Year 6 will not be expected to attend school.** Therefore, these year bands will break for the Summer holidays on **Friday 10**<sup>th</sup> **July**.

This will allow for a transition period in the final week of term, during which children in the other year bands will be able to meet their new teachers for the next academic year.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THESE PLANS ARE DEPENDENT ON CURRENT GOVERNMENT GUIDELINES IN RELATION TO RELAXING LOCKDOWN RESTRICTIONS AND COULD CHANGE SUBJECT TO FURTHER GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCEMENTS.

The completion of the feast and octave of Pentecost heralded the start of Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time celebrates "the mystery of Christ in all its aspects."

So, we have begun this time with the celebration of two important feasts that are far from ordinary - and we find a focus on the fundamental teachings and doctrine of the Church that seem controversial but fascinating.

Last Sunday, we celebrated Trinity Sunday, one of the few celebrations of the Christian Year that commemorates a reality and doctrine rather than a person or event. We remembered and honoured the eternal God: The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit and the unity of the Trinity. Essentially, the Trinity is the belief that God is one in essence (Greek ousia), but distinct in person (Greek hypostasis). The Greek word for person means "that which stands on its own," or "individual reality," and does not mean the persons of the Trinity are three human beings. Therefore, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are somehow distinct from one another - not divided though, yet completely united in will and essence. How can this be? Well, think of the sight of two eyes. The eyes are distinct, yet one and undivided in their sight. Another illustration to explain the Trinity is as a musical chord. Think of a C-chord. The C, E, and G notes are all distinct notes, but when joined as one chord, the sound is richer and more dynamic than had the notes been played individually. Each note in the chord is equally important in producing the rich sound, and the sound is lacking and thin if one of the notes is left out. A "mystery." By mystery the Church does not mean a riddle, but rather that the Trinity is a reality above our human comprehension that we may begin to grasp, but ultimately must know through worship, symbol, and faith. It has been said that this mystery is not a wall to run up against, but an ocean in which to swim. So, as St Paul told us that God is love, love and hence faith are the Ocean in which we all swim.

The next mystery of our faith was celebrated this Thursday, as every other year on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday, when the feast of Corpus Christi is celebrated in commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ and his twelve apostles before his crucifixion on Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday). The name 'Corpus Christi' is Latin for 'the body of Christ'. This jubilant festival was celebrated to proclaim the truth of the transubstantiation of bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ during Holy Mass through Holy Communion (Eucharist). Even though, every sacrament is held in highly esteem, the Eucharist has traditionally held a special place among them. To illustrate this, Ignatius of Antioch (105 AD) referred to the Eucharist as the "medicine of immortality" (Ephesians 20:2); St. Ephrem the Syrian (373 AD) taught that even crumbs from the Eucharistic host could sanctify thousands and thousands; St Thomas Aquinas considered the Eucharist to be the greatest of all sacraments. Thus, the Church has consistently viewed the Eucharist as unique, even among the sacraments. So, while every Sunday is a feast of the Eucharist, because by participating in the Mass, and in receiving Communion, we are honouring and celebrating the Eucharist, it is fitting that a feast exists to specifically commemorate the Eucharist. The Catholic Catechism summarizes this in its teaching of the importance of the Eucharist:

The Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life." "The other sacraments, and indeed all ecclesiastical ministries and works of the apostolate, are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it. For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch."


